This packet contains information for each scout and his family to use in preparation for our week at Camp Baldwin. If you have questions after reading this packet or viewing the Council's web site, feel free to contact Mr. Lowe or I **before June 27**. Camp Baldwin, one of the three summer camps of the Cascade Pacific Council, is located on the east side of Mt. Hood between Highway 35 and Dufur, Oregon. Baldwin is widely known for its horse program, high adventure opportunities, and wide choice of program for scouts at all levels and ages.

GENERAL INFORMATION

DATES: Sunday, July 25 - Saturday, July 31

DEPARTURE: Meet at 8:30 a.m. Sunday in the lower parking lot behind St. Matthew Lutheran. All scouts will be traveling in parent cars. Scouts and their backpacks will be unloaded at the Baldwin parking lot for their sack lunch and short walk into camp.

RETURN HOME: The parent cars should return to the church approximately 1:00 p.m. Saturday the 31st. *If your son must leave at a time different from our scheduled departure from camp, please notify me using the enclosed Early Departure form.*

WEAR ON SUNDAY: Full uniform, hiking boots, and outer wear appropriate to the weather.

BRING: All gear in a backpack with a sack lunch, and drink. A swimsuit needs to be in the pack - on top. The walk into camp is approximately 1/2 mile.

MEDICAL FORMS: An up-to-date annual medical form for scouts and adults is mandatory. The troop has the forms available to download.

** Phone calls to or from individual scouts for non-emergency reasons are not possible. **

Note: Adults' cell phones aren't always reliable in this location.

SPENDING MONEY:

Camp Baldwin has a trading post. Camp hats, T-shirts, sweatshirts, Scout craft items, some merit badge books and supplies, and limited snack foods are a few of the many items available for purchase. If he chooses, each scout's cash can be kept secure, and distributed at set times during the day. How much? Generally \$35 - \$ 50 should be appropriate. Some Merit Badges have extra costs. Horseback riding is extra, likewise. (More info. included in this booklet.)

FOOD:

Meals will be cooked by patrols in the campsite. Food is supplied by the camp. **If your son has any severe food allergies, make sure we know - in writing - soon.** Menu substitutions can be made, especially if we know in advance.

PARENTS: Several of you have already mentioned that you would like to assist at camp. Adults are certainly welcome and necessary. Troops are allowed 3 free adults to live with the troop for the week. Extra adults pay \$120 each. We have traditionally split any extra adult fees among all adults attending for the week. Please contact Mr. Lowe or me as to the length of your stay. Use the Permission Slip in this packet. You may not bring siblings or pets. It would be best if you brought your own sleeping facilities. (tent, etc.)

CAMP BALDWIN

Camp Baldwin is the council's summer horse camp. Horsemanship is central to the camp's program, along with waterfront activities and fishing on a four-acre lake, which is freshly stocked with rainbow trout each year. For older Scouts, the camp has a natural rock face climbing program, a day-long whitewater rafting trip, mountain-biking, mountain-boarding, wind surfing and a junior wrangler program. Baldwin is widely known as a camp with something for every Scout, young or older!

Arrival at Camp (On a Sunday Start Week)

Troops should arrive before 11:30a.m., eat their sack lunches, and prepare to hike into camp. Check-in will begin at noon. Your guide and commissioner will meet you in the parking lot at noon. Scoutmasters should head straight to the sign-in table with their unit rosters. If needed, you will be given an appointment time to review fees and registrations later in the day.

All units arriving at camp at a time other than noon on Sunday contact the Portland Service Center Camping Department at least two weeks in advance at 503.226.3423, 360.693.1741 or e-mail baldwin@cpcbsa.org to make arrangements for their arrival.

Your Senior Patrol Leader (SPL) should be prepared to lead your troop's hike in from the parking lot along with your Staff Guide. Medical forms for adults and youths are to be given to the Senior Patrol Leader for use during their camp tour.

Sunday Camp Tour

After meeting your commissioner and the camp business manager in the parking lot, your troop will be led on a tour of the camp. Your troop guide, who will also be visiting your troop throughout the week, will help your SPL lead this tour. During the tour, Scouts will learn how to clean dishes, stop at campsite to offload, and change into swim suits. The troop will conduct swim checks at the waterfront and visit several program areas.

While the Scouts are doing their tour, Scoutmasters are invited to use **one** vehicle to transport troop gear to the campsite, unload, and return the vehicle to the parking lot. Trailers are vehicles and are not allowed to remain in campsites.

Scoutmasters and all other adult leaders will attend a roundtable meeting at 3p.m. in the Program Center for an overview of the week ahead.

Swim Checks

During the camp tour your staff guide will include a stop at Lake Hanel where Scouts will take their swim checks.

These swim checks must be performed at camp and rechecked each summer. Adults who wish to participate in waterfront activities can visit the lake during open program beginning Monday and request a swim check from a lifeguard.

Saturday Arrivals

Saturday arrival is available to units traveling more than 4 hours or who, for religious reasons, cannot travel on Sundays. Check-in time on Saturday is 6p.m. at the Ranger's home. Early arrival **must** be arranged beforehand and there is a \$25 fee per troop for early overnight stay.

Mid-Week Arrivals

Adults arriving mid-week are asked to park in the parking lot and hike the short distance to the office for check-in. **Vehicles are not permitted in camp** during the week, so please pack lightly.

Bikes

Bikes will be locked for security in the high adventure area and are not to be ridden inside camp at any time. As Scoutmasters move troop gear into the campsites, they may drop off bikes for check-in at the bike area. Helmets will be secured with the bikes. If you are arriving after Sunday with a bike (s), they may be walked to the bike area any time it is open.

Fire Drill and Dinner

We will hold a camp fire drill at 6p.m. Sunday, during which all persons in camp will report to the parade grounds. Sunday dinner will be served as a camp-wide meal shortly after the drill.

Merit Badge Sign-up

Merit badge sign-up following Sunday dinner is the opportunity to sign up for horse rides, high adventure programs, and merit badges. This is a time for youth to plan their schedule. The only classes that may fill up are climbing and mountain boarding.

Chapel and Campfire

The finale for Sunday evening will be a chapel service and a rousing campfire program – a great way to start off the week!

Work Weekend

Every camp requires maintenance and improvement from year to year. Camp Baldwin relies very heavily upon the Scouters' family work weekend. Your troop's families can preview Camp Baldwin and make it a better place to camp this summer by attending our work weekend scheduled for May 15-17, 2009. Attendance at this work weekend is required for any Scoutmasters who wish to obtain the third Scoutmaster merit badge. Guests

Guests are invited to arrive at camp by 5:00p.m. Friday evening for dinner and campfire, and/or on Saturday morning, arrive by 8:30a.m. for brunch.

All guests are asked to check in at the office. Camp Baldwin has no facilities for lodging of guests within camp; please ask your guests to use the several Forest Service campgrounds near camp. Please remember to pay for day visitor meals so that we can continue to keep our fees low. Payments may be made at the office, Trading Post or in the serving line.

Communication

A phone for emergency use is available. Adults are encouraged to bring a cellular phone in case they need to contact the outside world. Cellular service is marginally available around camp. Wireless internet connection is available for those who would like to bring their laptop (limit 20 minutes per day, please).

Departure

Troops will be dismissed following the closing flag ceremony between 10:00a.m. and 10:30a.m. on Saturday.

Monday Troop Arrivals (On a Sunday Start Week)

Plan to arrive by 7:00a.m. for check-in and to move into the campsite. Your troop guide will meet your Scouts and take them to the commissary to check out gear and receive breakfast. The Scouts will then go to the swim checks and health checks. Swim checks and health checks will be conducted together at 7:30a.m. Scouts may go to any merit badge class they wish without signing up.

Due to limited space, the rock-climbing and mountain boarding programs are filled with a lottery system on Sunday night. For Monday-arrival Scouts to be included in the lottery, at least two weeks prior to your arrival, please send Camp Baldwin their names and which class times they would prefer:

Climbing: 9-Noon or 2-5p.m

Mountainboarding: 9-1:30, 10:30-Noon, or 2-3:30

PROGRAMS INFORMATION

Fishing

Lake Hanel abounds with rainbow trout. Scouts should bring their own equipment and observe limits of two fish per day and four fish per week (these limits apply to fish kept). We encourage catch-and-release with the use of barbless hooks. We have no facilities to store fish, so any kept must be cooked and eaten promptly. Adults may fish, but are asked to catch-and-release. No fishing license is required.

Historic Merit Badges—ONLY FOR 2010!

Four historical merit badges are ONLY available during the 100th Anniversary year, and we're offering all of them at Baldwin! The badges are Carpentry,

Pathfinding, Signaling, and Tracking. Please see the merit badge schedule for class times.

Horse Ride Adventures

For many years Baldwin has been known for its superb string of horses, and we are proud to offer an exciting riding program. Horse corrals are a rarity for Boy Scout camps, so we hope your troop takes advantage of this unique opportunity during your stay at Baldwin. In reviewing several local commercial riding outfits, we are pleased to be able to provide a high-quality riding program at a fraction of the cost of others. The costs of operating a full-size corral are tremendous; therefore, it is necessary to charge a fee for these activities.

Please note that all riders must wear closed-toed shoes, long pants, and a helmet (provided). Rides will leave at the scheduled time and riders should be at the corral at the time listed, as rides will not wait for stragglers. We cannot offer refunds on horse rides except in extreme circumstances (i.e., the Scout had to visit the hospital).

Mile Swim

Training throughout the week helps Scouts build up to complete a mile swim around Lake Hanel on Friday. Training sessions are held at the waterfront daily at 4:00p.m.

Snorkeling BSA

Instruction and equipment for snorkeling is provided in this under-water experience. Scouts will learn proper snorkeling techniques, as well as have the opportunity to explore the depths of Lake Hanel.

Trail to First Class (TTFC) – Eagles' Nest

Eagles' Nest is a program designed for young Scouts working toward their First Class rank. From 2:00 to 5:00p.m. Monday and Wednesday, any Scout can visit Eagles' Nest and work on any requirement needed. Adult leaders may schedule a campsite visit from their Commissioner to assist with additional Trail To First Class instruction. Baldwin can assist leaders in teaching almost all requirements for Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class. On Wednesday, a five-mile hike is available for Second Class rank requirements. **TTFC is dependent on adult leader involvement**; we ask and encourage all adults to come and support young Scouts on their journey towards Eagle.

HIGH ADVENTURE OPPORTUNITIES

CL Wrangler Program

The CL program (pronounced "C L BAR") is the Wrangler-In-Training program for older Scouts. To participate, a Scout must be at least 14 years old and have already earned the Horsemanship Merit Badge or are taking the badge con-currently. During the week Scouts learn a variety of advanced horse topics, while assisting the wranglers in preparing horses for rides and having a great time working with the knowledgeable wrangler staff.

Vulture Rocks' Cliffhangers

This program is an exciting introduction to rock climbing and rappelling for older Scouts. They will learn proper climbing skills, beginning with short climbs on a climbing wall, building up to three days at Vulture Rocks. Bring tight fitting shoes. For safety reasons, this program is limited to 12 participants in the morning and 12 in the afternoon (24 total per week), so a lottery system will be used to choose participants at the Sunday Merit Badge Sign-up. With this great program, a Scout may also complete requirements for the Rock Climbing Merit Badge. Scouts who are age 13 by January 1 or a third-year camper are eligible for this high adventure program.

Mountain Biking

Camp Baldwin's mountain bike program provides Scouts with an opportunity to experience enjoyable outings for a range of riders from casual to experienced. A member of the Camp Baldwin staff leads excursions along short trails outside of Camp Baldwin and on longer rides into the surrounding National Forest.

Scouts may bring their own mountain bike, provided that it is checked into the bike area on Sunday and ridden only while participating in this program with staff. Camp Baldwin is not responsible for any damage, repair, or loss of personal bikes at camp. Bikes must be in safe operating condition, and riders bringing personal bikes must also bring a helmet.

Mountain Boarding—NEW!

Mountain boarding is part snowboard and part skateboard. It is easy to learn especially if you have experience in skateboarding or snowboarding. We will start with low slopes and work up to more hills. There will be class times, and open mountainboarding fun most evenings at the High Adventure area. Limited to Scouts age 13 or older, and to available boards.

Whitewater Rafting

On Wednesday, Camp Baldwin offers Scouts a day-long river rafting trip on the Deschutes River. The Cascade Pacific Council contracts with a professional rafting company to lead rafters safely through Class I to Class III+ rapids. Every participant can expect to be completely soaked while negotiating the whitewater, therefore, be sure to wear appropriate attire including shoes that can be tied (no hiking shoes). Sun glasses must be secured with a band or string. Sign up before camp at www.cpcbsa.org/register.

Windsurfing

On Thursday, a windsurfing opportunity is offered by Camp Baldwin on the Columbia River in Hood River. Wetsuits, boards and helmets are all provided.

The program provides instruction by professionals for all participants on how to surf. Each participant should

expect to be surfing and having a blast after only a short time on the water, no matter their experience level! Sign up before camp at www.cpcbsa.org/register.

These programs (rafting and windsurfing) are available to Scouts who are 13 or older and to adults who have passed a swim check at camp. We must have a minimum of 8 and no more than 18 for each trip. Sign-ups are conducted on a first-come, first-served basis, so reservations prior to arrival at camp are recommended. There is an extra cost (\$55) to participate. Scout leaders provide transportation and are encouraged to participate.

RESOURCES AT BALDWIN

Your Campsite

Several items are provided in your campsite for your use during your stay at Baldwin: tents on wooden platforms, hose, shovel, and rake. Flags and axes are available upon request. If any items are missing when you arrive in your site, please ask your commissioner about them. Your troop will be held responsible for the care of this equipment and may be billed for any damage to equipment occurring during your stay.

Cooking

Firewood can be found around each campsite, but it becomes scarce as the summer progresses. It is highly recommended that troops bring a liquid fuel stove for each patrol. Cooking is faster, easier, and cleaner on stoves. The past few summers have been very dry, and the State Forestry Department may enforce a no-open flame policy during fire danger times. If this occurs, your liquid fuel stoves are the only alternative for cooking. Propane refills are available at camp at market price per gallon.

Per BSA National Policy, any fuel container not in use must be stored out of the campsite and in a designated facility. You may place fuels into storage, or take them out for use, by visiting the commissary anytime it is open.

Food

Menus are designed to provide balanced nutrition, ease of cooking, and allows patrols to work together. An example menu is available in the Baldwin section of the council web site at www.cpcbsa.org. Some troops like to bring extra spices to embellish their meals to taste.

All commissary items are checked out upon arrival and returned on Friday. Your patrol leader will be required to sign for the equipment your troop receives, and the

troop will be charged for any lost or damaged equipment at replacement cost. If you do not need certain pieces of equipment, you need not take them. Troops will not be held responsible for items they do not check out.

Twice daily, commissary staff will deliver food boxes to a food stop near your campsite. Each patrol needs to take an empty milk crate (they get the first one full of staple goods) to the pick-up site, and we will exchange the empty crate for a crate full of food portioned just right for each patrol. Please notify the commissary if you are receiving an improper amount of food. With your help we can feed everyone without waste.

Each youth and adult will need to bring his own mess kit and utensils.

Mail

Mail is fun to receive at camp. Include camp address, Scout name, troop number, and session dates. Be sure to include return addresses in case mail arrives at camp after a Scout has left. Adult troop leaders may pick up mail at the office just before dinner. Outgoing mail can be sent out at the camp office.

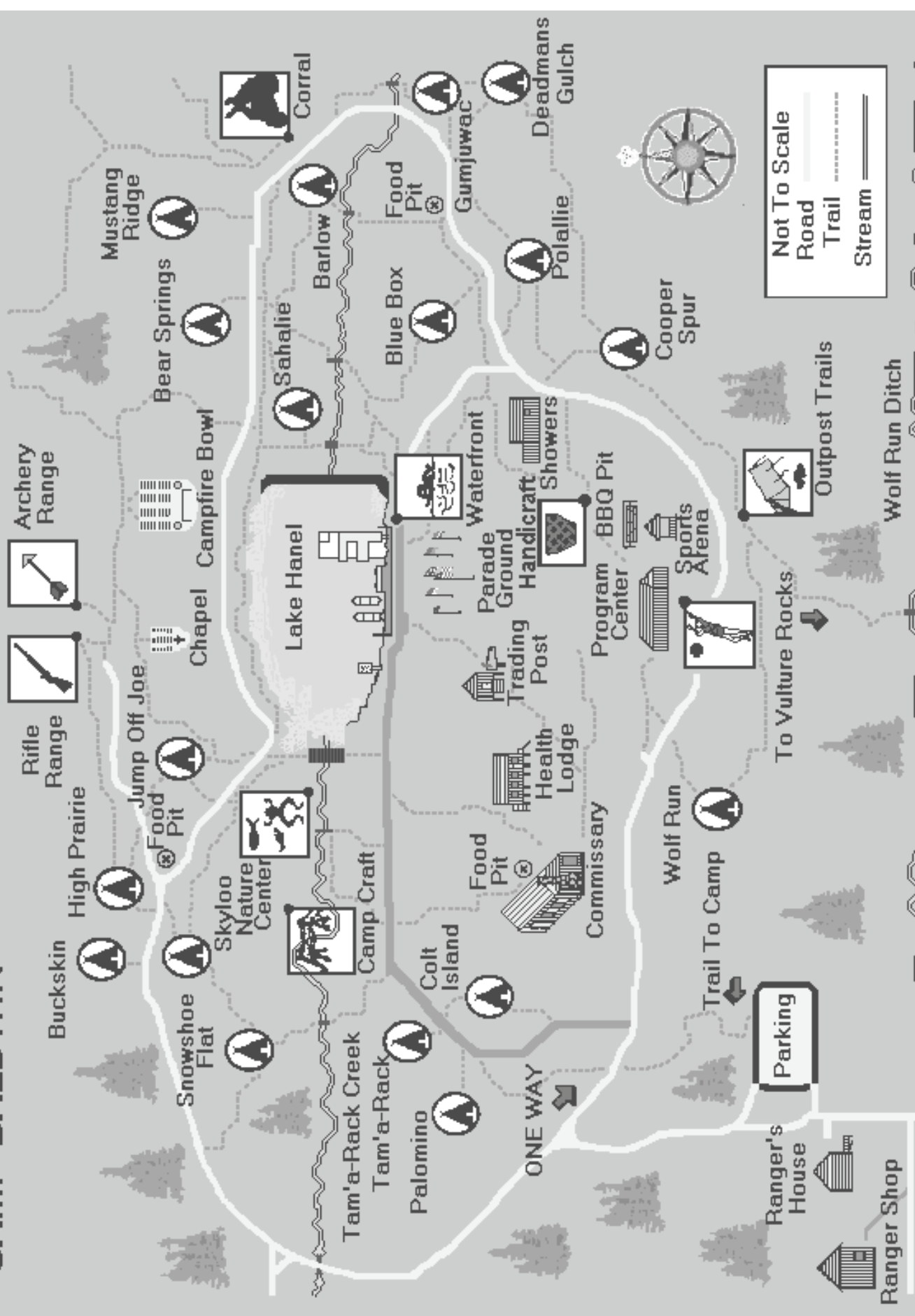

THE ADULT ROLE AT SUMMER CAMP

From Ken Mattson - Scoutmaster

The Council and Troop 124 welcome adults to camp for all week, a few days, or overnight. As you involve yourself in camp life a few guidelines will help you to have the best experience for yourself and your son, as well as the rest of the troop.

What are adults' specific duties?

There aren't many. The persons who run the troop are the Sr. Patrol Leader, the Patrol Leaders' Council, and the Scoutmaster. The camp staff runs "the program."

However, adults often:

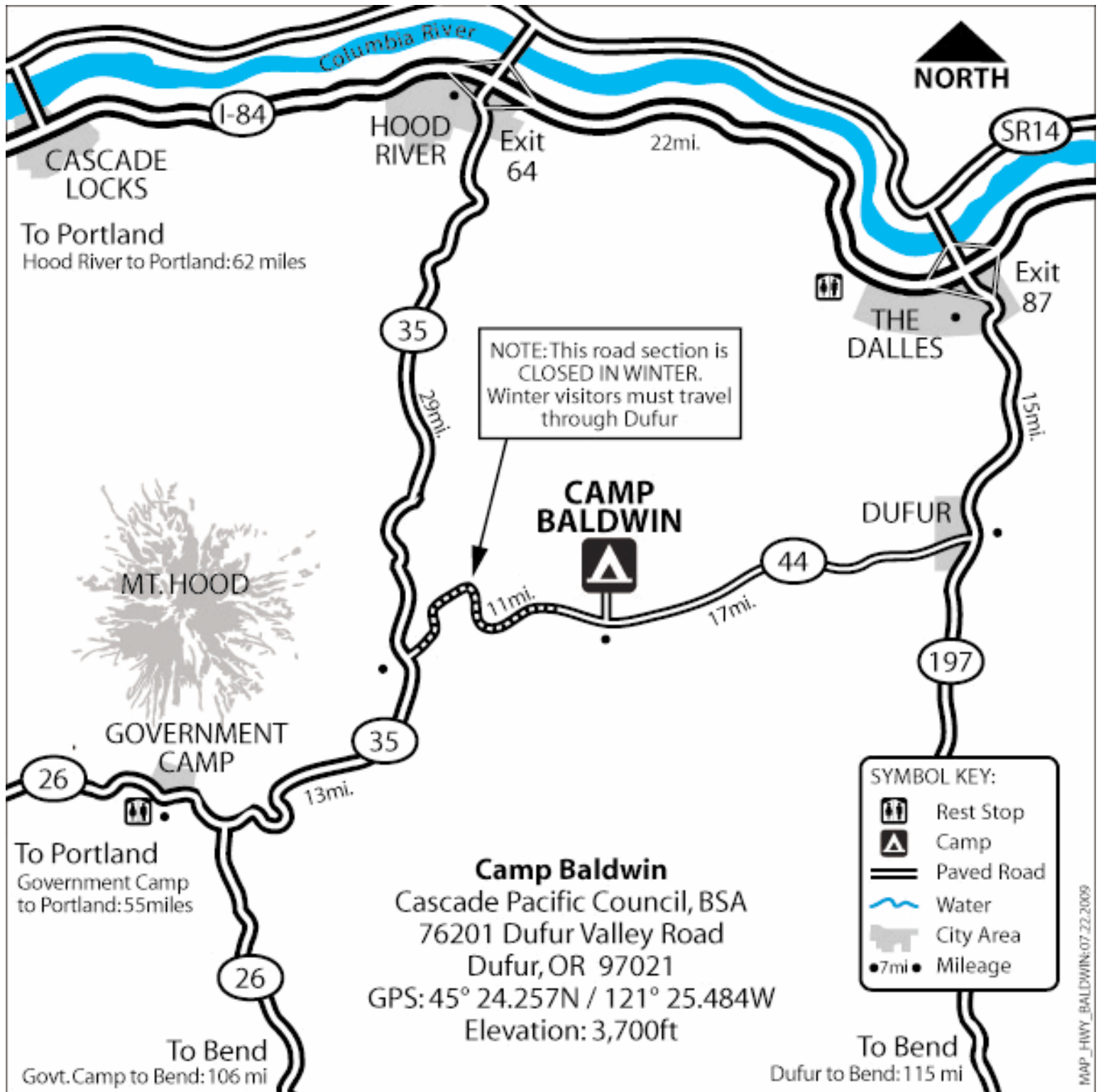
- * Assist scouts learning new skills. Remember Youth Protection Guidelines.
- * Take part in some of the camp program. There are special activities for adults.
- * Enjoy your son's activities - USUALLY FROM A DISTANCE. Leave him alone. Don't interfere or hover. Let him use the camp experience to become more independent and make decisions on his own. Wait to be invited.
- * Assist in Boards of Review for rank advancement. Help with record keeping.
- * Read, nap, relax throughout the day. (The camp and scouts will still operate.)
- * Watch the campsite for security.
- * Watch for safety violations. You are to stop any violent, or immediate hazardous situations involving the safety of boys. Otherwise, talk to me and I will then work through the youth leaders or handle the matter myself.

PLEASE DO NOT START GIVING ORDERS TO SCOUTS UNLESS YOU'RE IN AN EMERGENCY SITUATION WHERE AN ADULT MAY NEED TO TAKE CONTROL. It's a youth led program. The boys can't have 5 or 6 adults telling them what to do as that often causes confusion, misunderstanding, and hard feelings. Funnel observations, etc. through me. Most concerns at camp can be dealt with through the Sr. Patrol Leader and the Patrol Leaders' Council. Use the same procedure for harassment or hazing.

- * Allow the youth leaders to guide the troop and allow me to deal with possible discipline. If things get beyond us, we'll partner up with you for advice and / or assistance.
- * Be my eyes and ears. Lot's of stuff goes on.
- * Allow boys to be boys. Clean hands at meals and during cooking are important. Clean faces and clothes aren't necessarily vital. There are showers, and the lake to keep a scout clean. Most will choose to utilize them. Let me and the youth leaders deal with the "crusted" ones.

Some warnings based on personal experience and observations:

- * A parent "rescuing" a son from his own decisions at camp does not help him. It's a safe place to make errors as long as they're not immoral or physically injurious.
- * Summer camp is not school. Let the scout make decisions as to how many Merit Badges, etc. to work on. "Wasting time" might not be.
- * Homesickness is not fatal. We'll handle it. Boys "rescued" by parents from homesickness generally quit scouting. Key - keep them busy.
- * Summer camp is NOT the time to allow a boy to go off any medications. Quite the opposite.
- * Troop routine does not always run like clockwork. Don't worry, deficiencies will be worked out. Let the boys lead.
- * Don't feel hurt if you're counseled to "back off and let the boys handle it." Oh yes, it's happened to me.
- * There's probably more. We'll deal with them when they arise. Have fun!
